Overview: Repurposing flatware into plant markers.

Precautions:

- 1. If using forks or knives there will be sharp edges (optional)
 - 2. Use of scissors (optional)

Completion Time: 30 - 45 minutes

Materials: (10 participants)

- 1. Pieces of flatware; likely to use more spoons than knives and forks because of surface area for images (10+)
- 2. List of plants that plant markers are to be made for on board or large piece of paper to hang

(1)

- 3. Tape to hang list (optional) (1)
- 4. Images of plants the finished markers are to identify (magazines, seed packets, etc) (10+)
- 5. Scissors (1-10)
- 6. Permanent markers (1-5)
- 7. Letter stamps and ink (1 set)
- 8. Paper scraps (1-10)
- 9. Modge Podge (1)

- 10. Individual containers to pour Modge Podge into (10)
- 11. Foam brushes (10)
- 12. Roll of paper towels (1)
- 13. Container of water to use for glue clean up as needed during the activity and to put foam brushes into after every body is finished (2)
- 14. Covering to protect table or work surface (1)
- 15. Area for plant markers to sit while glue dries (1)

Pre-Session Prep:

- Create a list of the plants the markers are desired for on the large paper or white board; making letters large enough for participants to copy if spelling assistance is needed.
- 2. Collect supplies.
- 3. Make a few examples of finished markers using different options with images, written words and stamps.
- 4. Place table cover/protection over work space.

Step-By-Step Process/Instructions:

- 1. Introduce the activity.
- 2. Show examples of finished products.
- 3. Pass out 1 piece of silverware and 1 empty container for the Mod Podge to each participant.
- 4. Call out the plant list on the board/paper.
- 5. Have each person identify which plant they would like to make the marker for and write that person's name next to the plant on the list.
- 6. Place the images into central piles accessible to all participants.
- 7. Set out stamps.
- 8. Have participants choose what they would like to add to the marker.
- 9. Pass out scissors to those who wish to trim images; can also encourage tearing of the paper for a less tidy look vs using scissors.
- 10. Place ink pads out as needed.
- 11. Pour Mod Podge into containers at each person's seat and pass out foam brushes as you pour.
- 12. Encourage placement of glue either onto the silverware or

- the image to place initially and then cover the entire paper surface area with more Mod Podge, layering as needed to make a thick covering.
- 13. Place marker in designated area to dry until no longer tacky to the touch; time will depend on thickness of the Mod Podge applied.
- 14. Place in the garden once fully dried.

Tips:

- 1. Bang spoons flat with a hammer prior to creating markers if a falter surface is desired.
- 2. Get flatware from thrift stores or from the dollar store.
- 3. Pre-seperate images for each plant and put them into bags/containers so participants do not have to search through the pile. Only put scrap paper into piles on the table.
- 4. If somebody is not happy with the result, paste new images/paper over the old.
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
