Therapeutic Horticulture Activity Leaf Rubbing Cards

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Overview: Create leaf rubbings using crayons to embellish cards.

Precautions:

1. Involves fine motor skills

Completion Time: 45-60 minutes

Materials: (10 participants)

- 1. 3.5" x 5" pieces of plain white copy paper, one leaf rubbing per paper (20+)
- 2. Assortment of dark to medium dark crayons with the paper label removed; minimum of 2" in length will allow for rubbing using 3 fingers and thumb (20+)
- 3. Tape, painter or scotch (optional) (1-3 rolls)
- 4. Fresh leaves that are no larger than 3.5" x5"; use leaves with thick veins (ex., Red Bud, Oak) (10+ of each variety)
- 5. 8.5" x 5.5" card stock paper of desired colors, for making cards (20+)
- 6. Marker(s) to write name of plant leaf is from (optional) (1-10)
- 7. Glue sticks (1-10)

- 8. Table covering for crayon markings and glue (optional) (number of tables)
- 9. Envelopes to accommodate 4" x 5" card (optional) (10+)
- 10. Stamps for mailing (optional) (10+)
- 11. Information on plants of leaves used for project (optional) (1+)
- 12. Examples of leaves rubbed with names written on them for identification (optional) (1+)

Pre-Session Prep:

- 1. Create example of finished card
- 2. Cut white copy paper into 3.5" x 5" pieces
- 3. Cut cardstock paper into 8.5" x 5.5" pieces and fold in half with heavy crease
- 4. Collect fresh leaves

Step-By-Step Process/Instructions:

- 1. Show example of finished card.
- 2. Demonstrate rubbing of leaf; for larger group tape paper over leaf on a clipboard and demonstrate while holding up for better visualization.
- 3. Put paper "placemat" in front of each participant (see tips below) if desired.
- 4. Offer choice of leaves discussing what plant the leaf comes from
- 5. crayon color, cardstock color for participants.
- 6. Tape white 3.5" x 5" copy paper to table/placemat as needed; small pieces in 2-4 corners.
- 7. Encourage rubbing.
- 8. Pass out markers to write the name of the plant on rubbing paper if desired.
- 9. Assist in putting glue on the back of leaf rubbing and centering it on the bottom half of card stock paper.

Tips:

1. Use the whole 8.5"x11" paper to make it easier to manipulate and cut

- rubbing out afterwards.
- 2. Use fat crayons for participants with dexterity issues.
- 3. Tape outer edges of paper to table for participants with limited use of both hands
- 4. Use leaf rubbings to create framed art work, pendant, or for other craft projects.
- 5. If using darker card stock paper, glue a blank 3.5" x 5" piece of white paper to allow for area to write notes.
- 6. If Writing is a challenge for participants, pre-print/write with general messages (ex. 'Thinking of You', 'Get Well Soon', 'Hello', 'Thank You')
- 7. Put a larger "placemat" of paper at each participant spot to allow for sampling of colors and for glue overflow.
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
